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Relationship Therapy

By far the most common theme with Couples coming for therapy is a breakdown in communication. Under most relationship conflict, feeling taken for granted or adultery is a lack of communication which leads to feeling misunderstood or even invisible!

So why does this happen? Our brains are wired to find the easy option so we can often fall into unhelpful thought patterns where we mind read based on our experience of the person or do the other persons thinking for them rather than asking them. These strategies, we believe, save us time and avoid conflict, but do they really?!?!? How often has what you thought might be a simple exchange with your partner rapidly spiraled into an argument? When we do not feel connected, appreciated, or understood by our partners we live in a state of hyperarousal where we are unconsciously scanning for evidence that our partner does not get us or appreciate us. This is when a simple request can easily gets heard as a criticism, nag or put down. We then respond in a defending way or in defiance reply with a delaying phrase, 'I will in a minute' which sparks a reaction in the partner that made the request. These very simple and common exchanges that happen in relationships fuel the disconnection and frustration with each other and push us further into attacking and defending rather than communicating.

Part of couples therapy is learning about the behaviors we have slipped into that create distance in the relationship. We explore how each person is feeling and look at why this has come about. One of the first things I request couples to do in therapy is to try and listen to understand, rather than to reply! It is a bad habit we can all dip in and out of. This skill is called 'active listening'. We explore ways of trying to really hear what is being communicated rather than using assumptions or predictions which create an attack and defend dialogue. The key is to remove yourself from what you are hearing and ask clarifying questions. So often requests are actually a way to identify unmet needs in your partner.

We also talk about how we can communicate more honestly rather than from frustration. We do this by considering what we are observing, how we are feeling, what we need in that moment and then how to make a request. Leading with an 'I' statement and stating what we are looking for removes the attacking feeling and conveys your true meaning of a desire to connect and engage with your partner.

Using these skills builds self-awareness and can give individuals a sense of confidence. When we feel more aware and in control of our own reactions it is easier to communicate our needs and be fully present with our partners, which in turn strengthens the relationship.

Let's talk

What is 11+?

The 11+ is an exam students in Year 6 write in order to determine whether they will pursue their education in a grammar school.

When did I do my 11+?

I started my 11+ journey at the beginning of Year 5.

The easiest and hardest part of my journey

The easiest part of my journey was when I would do my practice papers at home. This was because I had practice in doing my mock test and I knew what to do. The hardest part of my journey was when I started doing questions within the set time limit.

This was because

I would make a wrong decision and start a section where I would take too long, lose time and therefore I would panic.

My top tips and

One of my tip would be to not spend too much time on a question and just mark next to it and move on and re-attempt later. I would strongly suggest to attempt the topics that are your strengths so that you have enough time to focus on the ones that are not your strengths. My best piece of advice is to check all the questions as many times as possible as you could have made a small mistake that can lead you to lose a mark!

Finally, try to practice the tests as many times as possible as that will boost your confidence. Never give up!



What is 11+ and when you do your 11+?

The 11+ is a test to get into a Grammar school. Although you go to Grammar school when you're Year 7, the test is held at the beginning of Year 6 - about 2 weeks after you start in September.

It consists of four main areas: Maths, English, Verbal Reasoning and Non-Verbal Reasoning with the last two not being covered at all in a Primary school. Hence, additional preparation or tuition is benefiical and needed.

The easiest and hardest part of my journey

Easiest was to keep going over areas I already know and was confident with (Maths for me). Hardest part was being consistent, doing homework EVERY day at least 30 min, sometimes one hour even during the last summer holiday leading to the exam when it was crutial not to give up!

My preparation journey

Personally, I decided to prepare myself fot this exam since it was a great opportunity to go to a more advanced school and get additionally challenged to further develop my skills. I also deeply believe it would greatly benefit my future to go to a repurtable University and get a better job one day.

My aspiration is to study in a grammar school where I get to learn

various skills that will help me in my future studies. And where I will

be continuously challenged to achieve my goals.

11+ preparation is different from what I learn in school. This requires a very high

level of preparation where new topics, techniques and strategies are taught.

Everyday I would complete the amount of homework that is required and have

weekly tuitions.

Weekly tests were conducted to evaluate my understanding of the topics I

learnt the previous week within the timeframe given.

I would complete practice papers and correct all the questions that I had got

incorrect on the same day. As the time for the 11+ approached, I would have mock tests. The mock tests gave me an overall idea about the exam, time

limits, the environment and the formation of the test.

My preparation journey

Well, my mum has been always expecting me to do additional work at home and we did some books together. She was convinced that tutoring your own child might not be effective enough so I started oficially tuition around mid-Year 4 in Berryields. My tutors made sure I had enough homework covering the four areas and my mum on the other hand, made sure I am completing it timely and she was always there to correct and further explain if I had any misconceptions and difficulties (she works at school and is very passionate about education).

My top tips and advice Make sure you read the questions VERY carefully and if you don't understand, don't spend ages, just move to the next one. For Non-Verbal Reasoning you only have 30 sec for a gueston, so you need to think strategically. Read variery of genres to expand your vocabulary because usually many students find synonyms and antonyms a bit tricky.

Also after dong a few MOCK exams, you'll easily spot your weakest subject. Make sure, you do more of what is challenging for you, instead of dwelling on the ones you're already confident with! Speed and attention to details are vital so practice, practice to make progress and incerease your chances because the competition is fierce. This is my recepie to get 156 points! Good luck to you all and I might see some of you in my Grammar school!





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RESPECT | ASPIRATION | RESILIENCE

I have been the Head of Aylesbury Vale Academy Primary for the last 5 academic years, having worked at the Secondary phase of AVA and at other local schools, both Primary and Secondary for the past 26 years. I am proud to work in a school which is so family and community orientated. We support local, national and international causes at the school and our staff are committed to making to difference to others. This academic year we have supported the community food bank, help raise £21,000 for the Brain Tumour Charity, collected 2 vans full of supplies which we sent to Pakistan for the Flood Relief and raised £1000 for the Azaylia Foundation (which supports children with Cancer). At Christmas, however, we turn our attention to our own community and our own children.

In December 2020 (during the pandemic) we became increasing aware of families that were struggling both emotionally and financially. As a direct result of this we realised that for many children Christmas was going to be a difficult, rather than magical time. That is when Berryfields Parish Council and Aylesbury Vale Academy joined forces to ensure that every child in our school community (and their siblings) received a gift at Christmas. We started a pledge and fondly named it 'Our Community Christmas Wish' in which we would ensure that no child would go with presents at this special time of year. On 23rd December 2020 the AVA staff 'elves' delivered over 50 presents to children across Aylesbury. We also provided 30 Christmas food hampers to families with children at Aylesbury Vale Academy. This was solely funded by Berryfields Parish Council and donations from the school staff at AVA.

Over the course of the next year we knew that we had to carry on with 'our wish' and decided to expand to help children and families from other local schools. In December 2021 the need for help had increased as families found themselves under increasing pressure and we were able to provide Christmas Gifts for over 100 children with the help of Berryfields Parish Council, Councillor James, Bucks Radio and the amazing staff at AVA. Again on 23rd December 2021 we delivered bags of gifts and food hampers to children and families in our community and the surrounding areas.

As the cost of living crisis hit in 2022 we decided that we needed to ensure that our wish expanded to other areas across the county. With the help of local businesses, the AVA staff, The WI, Bucks Radio, Cllr Susan Morgan, local Knitting and Sewing groups, HS2, local residents and the Parish Council's (on Berryfields and Fairford Leys) we provided 167 Christmas Stockings and 50 Christmas food hampers. We couldn't do this without our amazing supporters and local business owners.

In many cases these deliveries make a huge difference to the families over Christmas and they often help a bleak time be more enjoyable and special. The wish of every parent that I have worked with is to be able to provide for their family and to see their child opening a gift on Christmas morning. This year (2023) the need had increased once again, everyone is feeling the impact of the rising cost of living and for this reason we reached out further for help. My saying 'Father Christmas doesn't discriminate' applied now more than ever.

Our aim was to increase our gift list to 200 local children in December 2023 and to also provide food hampers through our friends at the Roman Park Food Bank and Buckinghamshire Community Board. We also received sponsorship pledges from Exterior Solutions (run by a local Fairford Leys resident), Minotaur Fight Store and Vale Tyres who were keen to help us grow and support our local children. Help like this made a huge difference.

In the days before Christmas the staff form AVA and Greenridge Primary School delivered over 200 gifts and over 50 food parcels. Thank you to all of our supporters and volunteers for making the lives of so many children happier, the difference you make by supporting this cause really is heart-warming and although the children are not aware of where the gifts come from the magic of Christmas is still alive for them all.


Do you enjoy driving and helping others?

Ever thought about volunteering but don't know where to start? Why not try your local heritage railway, right here in Quainton! The list of available roles is plentiful, and we currently need more hands on deck, so this Volunteer Recruitment Day has been set up to allow potential volunteers to meet current volunteers, take a look around the site, see an engine in steam and find out about what we do and how you might be able to lend a hand.

We have a huge variety of volunteer roles and, basically, these roles fit into one of two types:

- 'Behind the Scenes' volunteers generally come in during the week and help maintain the site and our artefacts whilst we are closed. This could be mowing, mending, strimming hedges and painting fences, or helping maintain or restore steam engines, carriages, railway buildings etc.
- 'Customer Facing' volunteers are the ones who come in and spend the day with us when we are open to the public on Sundays and other Special Event days throughout the year. These roles range from helping in our second-hand bookshop, cafe or gift shop, and welcoming visitors on the entrance gate, to crewing one of our steam engines, being a guard on the platform or helping to park cars on our especially busy days when we need as many volunteers here as we can!

You can come for as long as you want, as often as you want. Some volunteers come several times a week, others come only when we have a really busy event coming up. Volunteering is supposed to help you as much as it helps us, so you can do as much or as little as you like we'll appreciate each and every minute of your time you give us!
